On behalf of the Parish Council, I would like to take this opportunity to wish you all a very Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year, and to thank you all for the sterling fund raising efforts this year to benefit the Village.

Sadly despite previous requests in the last newsletter, speeding vehicles continue to be a problem with many of the culprits being from the village. With this in mind the Parish Council is considering the use of a Speed Gun and the assistance of the Police. Having been overtaken twice recently on unsuitable parts of the road this has highlighted the importance of making people aware, especially as the winter weather approaches adding to the dangers. Whilst it is a country lane, that in itself presents potential dangers as farm vehicles, horses, dog walkers and cyclists should all feel safe using these roads, as well as more sensible drivers. Please be aware of others and show consideration by slowing down -"Don't drive faster than a guardian angel can fly" is a good mantra. Also would parents please make their children aware that it is dangerous to stand in the road whilst waiting for the school bus - I encountered this one morning having been overtaken just down the road, any nearer and I shudder to think what the consequences could have been. So let's work together to keep Barnby a pleasant and safe place to live.

Barking dogs and dog fouling continue to be a blight on the village with complaints often being made to the Parish Council – so please be considerate to others and clean up after your dog and if it is barking, maybe take it indoors before it causes your neighbour or others a problem.

2017 has been a good year for All Saints. In Reverend Louise's first year as our Priest in Charge, we have seen our regular Sunday congregation double in size, and have felt a great deal of warmth and good will from everyone. Thank you to everyone who so generously supports the church throughout the year, and to the volunteer grass cutters, bell ringers, flower arrangers, cleaners and fund raisers.

Our biggest achievement this year has been thanks to Janine, who single-handedly redecorated the Chancel. The work involved many hours of hard labour, removing flaking paint and stains caused by water damage whilst the roof was off, and much moving around of scaffolding before two coats of paint went on. It has been such a transformation and it will spur us on to do the rest of the building, though the height of the Nave will be even more challenging.

The Fiends of All Saints have continued to support the PCC and enlisted the help of John Kitchen (who many of you know through Heather), to produce a new illustrated booklet about the history of All Saints. It is a very readable book with some excellent colour photographs, mostly taken by Janine, and again, many voluntary hours of work have gone into the project. The book is on sale in aid of the church restoration fund for £5, available from Yvette, John, Les or Janine.

We are also very grateful to Paul and Carol Speakman who with their interest in genealogy, have produced a full indexed list of all the headstones in the churchyard with details of the inscriptions, some of which are very old, and took a lot of deciphering. We shall keep a bound copy in church as a very useful reference book for visitors. Y.W.

A Christmas Message from the Vicarage:

We are fast approaching the end of another year as we find ourselves at the beginning of December and the season of Advent.

The word Advent means Coming. So, what or who is coming? Well if we look around us we won't be able to miss the fact that Christmas is coming. In fact, the retail industry would have us believe that Christmas has been coming since the end of September when selection boxes and advent calendars start to appear in the shops.

All of this points to the fact that we're not very good at waiting. If we're looking forward to a special occasion and finding it hard to wait, we respond by pulling the occasion forward. And so, because we're excited about Christmas, we start our preparations early, bringing the celebration forward, helping to ease our impatience. This may seem like a good idea and certainly being well organised is helpful, but often the consequence can be that we lose sight of the very thing we were waiting for and looking forward to.

One year, when I was a about 8 or 9 years old, I couldn't wait for Christmas Day and so I discovered where my parents had hidden our presents and I carefully unwrapped mine to take a peek and then carefully wrapped them up again, thinking my parents wouldn't be able to tell. But, of course, they did know and wisely told me that I would regret not waiting for the surprise. They were right. On Christmas morning when everyone else was excitedly opening their presents, not knowing what was inside, I knew exactly what each of my gifts were and knowing took the shine off unwrapping them. I wish I'd waited.

Advent encourages us to wait - but not in a passive, inactive way, but during Advent we are encouraged to wait with expectation and prepare ourselves to receive afresh the wonder of the Incarnation, the wonder of God coming to us in the form of a helpless baby, born now more than two thousand years ago, but also to look forward to when He will return again and bring the whole of creation together under the just and peaceful rule of God.

So how do we wait? Well, like the season of Lent, Advent is a time of reflection and preparation. Waiting can be about stepping aside the busyness and finding a prayerful time alone, but it can also be about doing things. Join us at a Christmas Service, read the story of Christmas in the Bible (The book of Luke is the best place), or maybe have a conversation with a friend and ask what they make of the real Christmas story. How ever you spend this season I pray that you will have a truly blessed Advent and Christmas. *Revd. Louise*

Very sadly in recent weeks we have lost two of our oldest residents, neighbouring farmers Lilian Bett and Bob Hewitt. They were good friends, bringing up their young families together, and giving their support to the village for 60 years.

Many people in Barnby were deeply shocked to hear of Lilian Bett's sudden and unexpected death. She very much liked Barnby and its community and was always ready to support events for the hall and church. She was renowned for her cookery skills and won the Preserves Cup at the Horticultural Show many times. The judge voted her lemon curd the best he had ever tasted and ate half the jar to prove it. She would always provide a pudding for village suppers and willingly donate a raffle prize and help with fundraising.

Lilian grew up in Laneham on a smallholding growing fruit and vegetables for sale in Sheffield, so was used to hard work. She and John moved to Grange Farm in 1954. Daughters Judith and Jill arrived, and the family was complete when twins Robert and Graham were born in 1959. After John's death in 1978 Robert and Graham took over the management of the farm. Lilian's first concern was caring for her home and family and she was especially proud of her four greatgrandchildren. She was always willing to make time to visit house-bound neighbours and offer help where it was needed. The people of Barnby are very grateful for the contribution she made during more than sixty years of her life spent in Barnby. Sadly, just a few days after Lilian's death we heard that ninety year-old Bob Hewitt had died peacefully in his sleep. His family were thankful that, with the help of the NHS Rapid Intervention Team and very dedicated carers they were able to look after Bob at Bleak House Farm, Barnby, their home for nearly sixty years. The early years at the farm were hard work, with livestock to care for, arable fields to cultivate and, during the winter months, hedges and ditches to maintain. In his middle years Bob joined Newark Golf Club and was proud to be made captain in 1982.

During his final years his main interest was working in the churchyard, where he spent many hours strimming, hedging and fencing. One summer he lifted and re-set over fifty leaning gravestones. His most memorable day was when he disturbed a wasps' nest behind the church, suffered multiple stings and went into anaphylactic shock. He was taken by air ambulance to Lincoln hospital, thankfully survived and was soon back at work in the churchyard.
